Celebration: An Intergenerational Model for Building Local and Global Community

A model for building local and global community draws on the efforts of Virginia Swain, as she persevered in her dedication to address the problematic process behind the UN Security Council Resolution sanctioning the Persian Gulf War by harnessing the power of children and child-like attributes in adults—innocence, generosity, sense of awe and wonder, curiosity, creativity and cooperation — to build global community in the United Nations with the Celebration of the Children of the World: A Model for Building Global Community (Master's Thesis, Lesley University, 1993).
